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Author's Note: These 20 short comedy skits which parody television commercials and products can be used in several different ways. For instance, all 20 of them can be performed sequentially as a single production. They can also be inserted as comedic "station breaks" or "fillers" to accommodate set changes in traditional theatrical plays and/or music programs. In addition, they can be videotaped for use in film/media/communications classes. These scripts further allow for interchangeability insofar as casting male and female roles.

1	1. Never Bossed
2	CACCE A
3	CAST: Announcer (modern clothing), Bob Cratchit (in late
4	nineteenth century clothing), Ebenezer Scrooge (in late
5	nineteenth century clothing with frock coat and top hat)
6	Female GPS voice (intercom).
7	PROPS: Small desk and chair, wall clock displaying 6:00, in
8	basket stacked with papers, quill pen and inkwell, ledger
9	books, two GPS devices. There is an entryway Upstage
10	entrances and exits are also made Stage Left and Right.
11	(AM DIGE G ALL AND
12	(AT RISE: Spotlight on ANNOUNCER Downstage Left.)
13	ANNOUNCER: (To audience) Has this ever happened to you'
14	(Lights up On-stage. BOB CRATCHIT glances at the clock
15	sets his quill pen aside, and closes a heavy ledger book. As
16	he gets out of his chair, a grumpy SCROOGE enters from
17	Stage Right with a dusty stack of ledger books and papers.)
18	SCROOGE: Ah, there you are, Cratchit. (Plops everything or
19	desk.) I'll expect these ledgers done and on my desk by
20	the close of business.
21	CRATCHIT: But Mr. Scrooge, sir, (Indicating clock) it is the
22	close of business and I was just —
23	SCROOGE: Not leaving, were you? Time is money, Cratchit
24	Isn't that what I always say?
25	CRATCHIT: Yes, but it's Christmas Eve, sir. I was hoping to
26	spend time with my family.
27	SCROOGE: Bah humbug! You can spend twenty-four-sever
28	with them if you're unemployed! (Points finger in
29	warning.) And don't even think of asking for tomorrow
30	off! (He exits; CRATCHIT looks on in despair).
31	ANNOUNCER: As you can see, Bob's problem is that he's
32	just too easily accessible. What he needs (Pulls out GPS
33	device) is the Never Bossed, a unique global positioning
34	system that helps you find your boss before he finds

you. (CRATCHIT pulls the device out of his pocket, grins

1	broadly, and turns it on.)
2	FEMALE VOICE: Your boss is approaching at twenty feet.
3	Turn sharp right. (CRATCHIT hastily exits Upstage just as
4	SCROOGE enters from Stage Right, looks around, and exits
5	Left.) At the next intersection, (CRATCHIT enters from
6	Upstage) turn left. (CRATCHIT exits Stage Left as
7	SCROOGE enters from Upstage, looks around, and exits
8	Stage Right.) You are making good time and should
9	proceed straight ahead. (CRATCHIT enters from Stage
10	Left, looks relieved to see that SCROOGE is nowhere in sight,
11	he starts to exit Stage Right.) To avoid a possible collision,
12	back up immediately and make a hard right.
13	(CRATCHIT walks backwards quickly and exits Upstage just
14	as SCROOGE enters from Stage Right and crosses to exit
15	Stage Left. This silliness continues through the end of the
16	commercial.)
17	ANNOUNCER: (To audience) To enjoy a thirty-day free trial

ANNOUNCER: (To audience) To enjoy a thirty-day free trial of Never Bossed, call the toll-free number at the bottom of your screen. (Points to product.) Never Bossed — the only tool you'll ever need to navigate your way around a job and keep one step ahead of work.

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2. Biff Notes

26 CAST: Announcer, Teacher, 6-8 Students, and Biff (all wear modern clothes).

PROPS: School desks and chairs, Jeopardy-style game panel with title categories: Shakespeare, Mythology, Poetry.

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(AT RISE: Class is currently in session with TEACHER and STUDENTS. DAPHNE, a student, raises her hand.)

33 TEACHER: Yes, Daphne?

34 DAPHNE: I'll take Shakespeare for an A, please.

35 TEACHER: (Turns the top square to reveal the name Ophelia).

1 And the answer is "Ophelia." (All hands except one simultaneously shoot up. TEACHER picks a student.) Alan?

ALAN: Who was Hamlet's girlfriend? (Sound effects: Dinging game show bell)

TEACHER: Correct. Next category. James?

6 JAMES: I'd like Poetry for a B.

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- TEACHER: (Turns a poetry square to reveal the words "Summer's Day.") What is the phrase preceding the words "Summer's Day"? (All the same hands shoot up.) Tracy?
- 10 TRACY: "Shall I compare thee to a summer's day?" (Sound effects: Dinging game show bell)
- 12 TEACHER: Correct. (As the game continues, a FRUSTRATED

 13 STUDENT who has never raised his hand turns to the

 14 audience.)
- 15 FRUSTRATED STUDENT: How come everybody knows the 16 answers except me?! If I don't pass this class, my coach 17 won't let me play! (Lights off On-stage and spotlight on 18 ANNOUNCER, Downstage Left)
- 19 ANNOUNCER: Are you struggling to make the grade? Why be so hard on yourself by wasting countless hours at 20 21 the library or straining your brain with homework 22 that's just not getting you anywhere? If you don't want 23to miss the fun of going to parties or hanging at the mall, one simple phone call to Biff Notes can solve all 2425 your problems. (Spotlight Downstage Right on BIFF, a big, 26 slow-talking guy who doesn't look entirely bright. He is in the **27** midst of explaining Julius Caesar to the FRUSTRATED 28 STUDENT.)
- BIFF: And so Caesar, he goes like, "Eee tude, Brute?" and then his bud just shrugs and goes like "Hey man, it's March fifteenth what didja expect?" And then Tony who's this other toga dude goes and makes this speech to his buds, Romans and like whoever, and then they all go, "Whoa, maybe we shouldn'ta done that," and there's battles and stuff and the Tony dude and

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
