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INTRODUCTION

The success of the presentation will depend on how well the mime can capture the mood of the character. Look at the commonplace and seek to exaggerate. You too will enjoy the humor that is distinctly human.

This is a wake-up call for fun!

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Morning Paper

3 SCENE: In front of the house, inside and out, as the morning paper
4 is retrieved.

5 CHARACTERS: MASTER: Reader of the morning paper and super
6 trainer of the family dog. FIDO: Family dog, well-trained and
7 not a reader of the morning paper.

8 MASTER enters from Stage Right, stretching and 9 yawning. FIDO is curled in a fetal position just Left of 10 Centerstage. MASTER sleepily walks across the stage 11 without seeing FIDO. The dog reacts to the nudge as 12 MASTER stumbles into his sleeping form. MASTER reaches 13 down to pat FIDO on the head in apology.

FIDO snarls in reaction. MASTER jerks back his
hand and tries a cautious approach. FIDO shakes himself,
and stretches his back as he increases the distance
between hands and knees to maintain an "all fours"
position. FIDO appears to be fully awake and in a better
mood as he shakes his rear end to wag his "tail."

MASTER advances to Centerstage, facing the $\mathbf{20}$ audience, as he unlocks, unlocks and unlocks the well-21 bolted front door. He points the way down the front walk 22 to the intended object of his search — the morning 23 newspaper. FIDO moves slowly toward the door and also 24 gazes down the walk; he turns and moves away from the 25 door. MASTER applies his training experience to obtain 26 the desired results. He walks toward the door putting 27 his hand on the dog's collar and firmly pulling in the 28 direction of the door. 29

30FIDO has another idea. He continues walking away31from the front door. MASTER allows himself to be pulled32along then releases the dog. MASTER walks to the door33and slaps both thighs. FIDO, still in the position of34retreat, turns his head to look over one shoulder, shakes35his head negative. MASTER tries again but FIDO curls up

1 into his sleep position and resumes his nap. 2 MASTER pulls his clothing tighter to brave the cold 3 and walks out to get his own paper. He bends to pick up the publication and unrolls the cylinder to begin reading 4 the headlines. Behind him, FIDO unwinds and walks to 5 the door nudging it shut with his nose and returns to his 6 sleeping position. $\mathbf{7}$ 8 MASTER reacts to the slam of the door by looking 9 over his shoulder: he is unconcerned by the supposed windblown portal and resumes his scan of current events. 10 A few seconds pass and MASTER decides to re-enter his 11 12 castle. He rolls the paper into a cylinder and approaches the door. He turns the knob but the door does not open. 13 14 MASTER places the paper under one arm and places both hands on the knob. Again the door will not open. 15 16 MASTER turns to look both directions and sees no 17 chance of help. He pounds on the door with a fist, nothing 18 happens. He rings the doorbell, nothing happens. He 19 remembers the plant which hides a spare key. MASTER 20 lifts the potted plant with much effort to the right of the 21 door, no key. 22 MASTER remembers the watchdog on guard inside. 23 He knocks on the door and listens, no sound. He places 24 two fingers on his lower lip to blow a whistle; he listens 25 for movement inside, no sound. MASTER sits in front of 26 the door, leans his back against the fortress and reaches 27 for his paper. He reads for a moment then puts the paper 28 down to pull his clothing tighter because he is now well 29 chilled. MASTER looks Stage Right and Stage Left, still 30 no help is in sight. He picks up his paper and resumes 31 his reading. 32 FIDO wakes and stretches. He turns his head from side 33 to side and hears nothing. He barks, still nothing, FIDO walks 34 slowly to the front door. He scratches on the door and

slowly to the front door. He scratches on the door and
 turns his head to the side, to listen, but nothing happens.

FIDO stands on his hind legs and places his mouth on the door knob. He turns and the door begins to open slowly. The weight of the MASTER causes the door to swing open as he falls into his castle. FIDO is pleased with his efforts and rushes to grab the paper from his trainer's hand.

FIDO prances proudly around the room waving the paper back and forth as he wags his tail. The MASTER gets to his feet, brushes himself off and advances toward FIDO. MASTER removes the paper from the mouth of FIDO. He carefully rolls the tattered scraps into a neat roll. MASTER slaps the paper against his thigh and points to the door.

FIDO has gotten the message; he drops his head and slowly exits out the front door. The MASTER closes the door behind his dog and exits Stage Left, truly the king in his own castle.

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
