

PRODUCTION NOTES

This musical was created to be a comedy-farce with many novelty songs integrated into the show's story. The CD recording of the music provides music for both singers and speakers. In many places during the show there are opportunities for the performers to speak over rhythmic music to enhance what they say. If the timing of this becomes too difficult for the actor, the rhythmic music may be faded out at the director's discretion. The length of some of the songs may be shortened, if necessary, by ending the song after the first chorus.

Tweedledum and Tweedledee tell the story of the walrus and the carpenter over music. On our vocal rehearsal track their parts are spoken by the same person. In performance, two distinctively different voices for the twins may be more effective.

The entire show should be played with tongue-in-cheek humor. All members of the cast (except J. Frumious Bandersnatch and the Jubjub Bird) remain in the Wonderland world and don't connect directly to the audience. J. Frumious and the Jubjub Bird may talk (or gesture) to the audience with some sly "asides" if the director chooses.

During casting auditions we suggest that you base your casting decisions more on comedic potential than how well a person may or may not physically resemble their role. Look for actors that can sing and move with comic rhythm. If they can dance, all the better, for there are many dance breaks included in the show. Special abilities like dancing, trick voices or funny expressions will add more to the show than singing talents alone. Adapt this script to include all your novelty talents where possible — they will enliven the show as they add a professional touch.


Act One—scripts for Frumious to pass out to the Chorus Ensemble; placard—one side says "Hectan-red nab, Suo-i-murf" and the other side says "J. Frumious Bandersnatch"; easel; Burble and Whiffle candies; two road signs pointing in opposite directions "To Tweedledum's House" and "To Tweedledee's House"; rattle; bolsters; blankets; dish covers; pots and pans; two swords for Tweedledum and Tweedledee; cardboard cutouts of sun, waves, moon, cloud and birds.

Act Two — trumpet; parchment scroll; gavel; teacup; bread and butter; memo book; book, Alice's Adventures in Wonderland; basket with Burbles and Whiffles; drum.

COSTUMING



Two-Person Jabberwock




The Jabberwock head can take on many forms — ferocious or funny.

The features of the head may be formed with paper strips pasted on a helmet, molded into shape and painted; or the head may be made from padded fabrics.

The Jabberwock can also be a single person wearing whatever head design you choose. Drape him or her in a body sheath with "scales".

In both instances the Jabberwock needs a tail. Dragon wings are optional.

Tweedledum and Tweedledee

J. Frumious Bandersnatch doesn't require any special costume. Any bizarre costume you have will do fine. In Wonderland, anything goes.

The Jubjub Bird is half person, half bird. A bird-beak headpiece may be all that's needed. The costume could simply be tights with a small tail added.

Young

Prince

The Young Prince should wear leggings or tights and a short princely kilt with a wide belt. He need not carry a shield, but he must carry a long sword for threatening the Jabberwock.

The White Rabbit should carry a briefcase, wear a hat with ears protruding and carry a cane as he rushes about.

The Mock Turtle costume may be a colored shell attached to his body front and back. It can be constructed in the same way as Humpty Dumpty's egg outfit.

The Mad Hatter needs only a tall hat and a bright colored suit coat. He's a businessman of sorts.

The Red King and Red Queen may be attired in red robes, if available, and they both wear royal red crowns.

The Soldiers will look military in red jackets with white belts. Grey trousers may be okay. If boots are available, they will help the military look.

The Jurors should be dressed in any type of wild attire that's available. This is Wonderland where hardly anyone dresses the same.

The Chorus Ensemble offers your choice of many options. They may all dress the same in varying colors, or they may all be attired individually in the same color.

The costumes can be rented or made by volunteers who may be parents, friends or a school art department.

During the various musical numbers, one or two of the best dancers in the Chorus Ensemble may step forward and do the type of dance appropriate to the music and their dancing skills. In some numbers the entire ensemble may move in unison. This is especially effective to end the first act and for the final musical number of the performance.

Set Design:

The set for the show should be colorful and fanciful, suggesting Wonderland. It may consist of brightly colored, self-supporting, moveable flats with a painted backdrop. If available, several scrims might suggest a variety of mood settings from Tulgey Wood to the Courthouse. If backdrops or scrims are not available, the stage crew could carry in a few trees for the woods, tall chairs for two thrones, and a table and several chairs for the bailiff, the defendants and the jury.

Choreography:

This show offers songs with many musical styles including 50s rock, boogalo with doo-wop, tango-calypso, ragtime and hoedown. All have a strong beat to give non-professional dancers an easy opportunity to improvise any dance steps they may choose.

Lighting:

A variety of colored lights will help establish the wonder of Wonderland. Two spotlights will help direct attention to key characters throughout the play.

Burbles and Whiffles for Fundraising:

"Burbles and Whiffles" can be sold to the audience during the intermission and before and after the show. "Burbles" can be any fluffy-type sweet about the size of a plum. They can be purchased at a bakery or baked by volunteers. Licorice sticks make perfect "Whiffles" to go with the "Burbles". They can be purchased at candy stores or in the candy section of many supermarkets. Licorice sticks are best because they are hollow and can be "whiffled through". The price for these bagged goodies, sold to the audience, should be double the cost of purchasing or making them. This is a fair mark-up for having fun and raising money to pay expenses for your next production.

CAST OF CHARACTERS

J. Frumious Bandersnatch — Energetic, lucid, and persuasive. He is dedicated to revealing the true personality of the Jabberwock for all to see.

Jubjub Bird — He's J. Frumious' constant companion. He can't speak, but he gestures comically to make his ideas known. He's J. Frumious' "Yes" man.

Young Prince — He's dedicated to his assignment to kill the Jabberwock with his vorpal blade. His single-mindedness never wavers until he tastes the Burbles and Whiffles.

White Rabbit — He, too, is single-minded. Always in a hurry.

Humpty Dumpty — The same pompous egg we've always known from the nursery rhyme. He talks with puffed-up cheeks and pats his belly when he nods approval at everything he says. Totally self-centered.

Tweedledum — He's a carbon copy of his cute and chubby brother Tweedledee. He agrees with his twin and visa versa.

Tweedledee — Like his brother he merely responds to whatever comes before him. These twins are delightful in their simplicity.

Mock Turtle — He's a melancholy fellow who would like to have fun but he's too worried about being made into soup. He talks slowly in a monotone until he describes the joy of a Lobster Quadrille.

Red King — He wants to be the head man of Wonderland but his wife, the Red Queen, often gets in the way. He always prevails but often looks like a buffoon in doing so.

Red Queen — She's snappish. She wants to have everyone's head chopped off. Her imperious attitude makes her look silly.

Mad Hatter—A cowardly and preoccupied hat maker. He has little interest in anyone but himself.

Soldier 1 — An obedient servant to the throne.

Soldier 2 — The same. They speak only to make announcements.

Jurors 1, 2, 3 — They, too, have only short lines to move along the action.

Bailiff (may be played by one of the Soldiers)

Chorus Ensemble — They sing the refrains to the songs and they back up the soloists to give the vocal numbers more energy.

The Dancers — They dance with the characters as indicated. They, too, are used to add comic energy to each scene.

Acknowledgement of the Entire Crew

After the show concludes, we have provided enough reprise music on the CD so that everyone involved can take a bow. This show is made possible thanks to the talents of as many "backstage people" as "on stage performers." The Jabberwock, or another leading performer, should acknowledge individually the costume crew, stage designers, lighting engineers, stagehands and others.

About the Composer

Lauren Mayer has won many awards for her original music in both professional and educational spheres. She is the recipient of a Peninsula Community Fund arts grant to write and produce educational musicals in local schools. As co-founder and song writer for "Curriculum Rocks" which produces educational music CDs for kids, she currently has three CDs in distribution. A professional theatre in the San Francisco area, Broadway by the Bay, commissioned her to write "December Rainbow." Her comedy songs have been broadcast on various radio shows. She is the five-time winner of the San Francisco Cabaret Gold Award.
